I know. You don't have time to volunteer. Me neither. If I had time to spend at a show where I wasn't even riding I'd spend it instead catching up on all the other things I'm behind on. I definitely couldn't spare a whole Saturday down in Darien helping at the CDA Ox Ridge show.

But I ended up there anyway. I'm not sure how. I helped with scoring for half a day and ring stewarding the other half. I was worried about both, Ox Ridge was a big show and I'd never done either before. But Frances was quite confident that I wouldn't have any problems (you might know Frances Owles, longtime CDA board member and officer). She was also very friendly and welcoming when I called, newly arrived from down South, to find out who and where the trainers were and what tack stores had the best selection. Come to the show and meet some new people she said, it will be a lot of fun. You'll have a great time, she said, I promise.

And I did. Met some new people and had a great time at Ox Ridge. Some of the new people were right in my barn, just riding at different times of the day. Some were at the opposite end of the state. The other volunteers were friendly, showed me what to do and offered to help if I felt lost. I learned to score and check tests before the first class was underway, Frances was careful and thorough and it was easy. Then I got to ring steward the upper level ring all during the afternoon freestyle rides. No problem.

The truth is, I had a lot of fun and it was because of the other volunteers and the competitors. Well actually, a couple of the competitors were pains. But most of you made us glad to be there, glad to help make your show day both fun and useful. It was great watching known and new instructors ride, seeing some wonderful horses with beautiful gaits, appreciating the well schooled horses with ordinary gaits and the riders who courageously gave good rides to the occasional naughty or inexperienced horse. One horse was terrified of the judges' stand and jumped sideways around the ring each time he approached it. A man was riding him, an amateur rider I found out by talking to his wife, who sat tall and still, and with quiet hands and imperceptible aids managed to reassure the horse and complete the test with increasing confidence on the horse's part. I remembered that ride the very next week when I was riding my own disobedient beast, getting increasingly frustrated as he skittered by every time we passed a doorway creaking in the wind. I saw the consequence to the horses of good and bad riding while volunteering at the show, and felt a renewed commitment to where I wanted my riding to be.

I learned a lot helping make that show a success, so it was a day well spent all around. I also got to add several new horse-friends to my address book. No experience, never volunteered before. You too? Come out and help next time. Volunteer. You'll have a great time. I promise. (And did I mention that you get to eat free all day?)

Most of all, we thank Vicki and her staff at Once Again staff, who set up the arena and spruced up the barn and grounds—and generously donated their facility to help our scholarship fund. Voluntary Commitment

No, you won't read here how your dedicated board members finally went round the twist and all tramped off to a large padded room together (although the idea does have it's merits!), this article is addressed to you, our "rank and file" CDA member, our greatest untapped asset. The people in our organization who, for varied reasons, haven't yet signed up to volunteer for anything.....(notice I said "yet"....)

The CDA has long relied on volunteer help to be a successful organization. We enjoy a much higher percentage of volunteer help than many other GMO's, but we don't wish to wear out our welcome with our dedicated volunteers who are there year after year....after year

We know that many of you would *like* to volunteer but have no experience. We are going to address that issue in the Spring of '99 with a clinic focusing on understanding the new Dressage Tests. This clinic will help riders and volunteers alike, as there will be practice scribing, practice scoring, even a look at managing and all the varied details that includes. Watch this space for more details on this great event.

So in that light, we are looking for volunteers to form a new committee to run our recognized Dressage Competition which will be held at Ox Ridge Hunt Club on June 5th and 6th 1999. Now, before you all run the other way saying "I can't run a big horse show..", the whole point of having a committee this year is so that no one person (or couple) will *have* to run a big horse show. Last year our stalwart president and her hereto fore sainted husband did just that, and did a wonderful job. However, our recognized show has grown from a one ring, one day event to a major player on the New England Show scene. This show has the capability to become a four ring competition, and could be a major money maker for our Organization. That fact is important because if there is more money in the treasury, we can do more of the things our members would like, and put more cash into the scholarship fund.

Here's a little outline of the jobs involved, (and remember, they were handled largely by Debbie and Steve last year).

Manager: This is the person responsible for the judges, securing the dates with the AHSA a year in advance, dealing with the site including the stabling, rings, electrician, porta potties, getting all of the information into the NEDA omnibus by November of the preceding year, securing host hotels...the list goes on.

Secretary: A job for the very organized. Meticulous bookkeeping is required, the AHSA suffers no fools, gladly or otherwise. The secretary does all the times, and then re-does them when no one, for whatever reason, can ride at their original times. The secretary makes sure all the details are dealt with.

Volunteer Coordinator: Cornelia Hamilton, a volunteer par excellence, is an absolute whiz at this job. Volunteers, or the lack of them, can literally make or break a show (as one major competition recently discovered...). This is work which needs to be started months in advance of the actual event. Volunteers are needed for everything from awards to setup, scribes, runners, scorers, stable manager, parking..... The ability to deal well with people is the core of this position.

Sponsorship: This is a position which can make a very big difference to the bottom line of the show. The profit made on a show often equals the amount of sponsorship raised. Everyone is fair game for sponsorship, from big corporations to backyard barns to individuals. Creativity is the hallmark of a good Sponsorship Chairman.

Hospitality: Ever see that TV advertisement for the hotel where the front desk guy gets the cricket to stop chirping because it is keeping one of the guests awake? If that ad spoke to your soul, *you* are Hospitality chairman material. If your reason for existence is to see other people happy, comfortable and well fed, we need you (I think I just described my Mom!) Little things like mints on the judges pillows (make sure the air conditioning is on in the room first!) can really help everyone have a memorable time.

Publicity: Ever wonder why you don't see much dressage coverage in the media (other than the fact that, to the uninitiated, watching a lot of lower level tests is sort of like watching paint dry...) It's because there isn't enough publicity! And part of the publicity can be educational, so there are fewer uninitiated and more people debating the merits of working horses deep, accountability for judges, etc.

Program Layout: Our program is not only a very useful tool for the competitors, listing schedules, judges, a place to post all the scores etc. It is a venue for our sponsors to reach potential clients. It's also a guide for our spectators. A well laid out program will enlighten spectators on not only who they are watching, but what to look for. And all presented in an attractive package!

So, can you see yourself fulfilling any of these roles? Even if the idea of being involved intrigues you, give us a call, you too can enjoy voluntary commitment!

News For Group Members

Change in USDF's Monthly Publication

(Excerpted from Vice President Sam Barish's Message for the Fall Region One Newsletter)

Unfortunately, there Will be another change in USDF's monthly publication due to the following: In March 1998, Primedia, Inc. purchased Cowles Enthusiast Media, publishers of *Dressage & CT*

In June 1998, Primedia purchased Fleet Street Publications, publishers of *Dressage Today*. For financial reasons, Primedia does not want to continue publication of competing dressage magazines with a limited market. Accordingly, Primedia has decided to cease publishing *Dressage & CT* (USDF's official publication) after the December 1998 issue.

Because of the complexity of issues concerning USDF's monthly publication over the past four years, the Executive Board has decided to consult the membership for input at the Annual Meeting in Savannah before making a decision on the publication route we should take.

Options

Several options are being considered

which include, but are not limited to:

(1) a partnership with *Dressage Today* with *Dressage Today* printing the USDF newsletter and mailing it with *Dressage Today* subscriptions; those not subscribing to *Dressage Today* would receive the USDF newsletter only. The magazine would no longer be a member benefit, members would be sent a 16-page newsletter. Subscriptions would be sold at a reduced cost for USDF members.

(2) a monthly newsletter of USDF information published by the USDF office or an outside company; and

(3) a bi-monthly or monthly dressage magazine produced by the USDF office.

We will be glad to provide further information. This subject will be a hot topic of discussion at the USDF Annual Convention in Savannah.

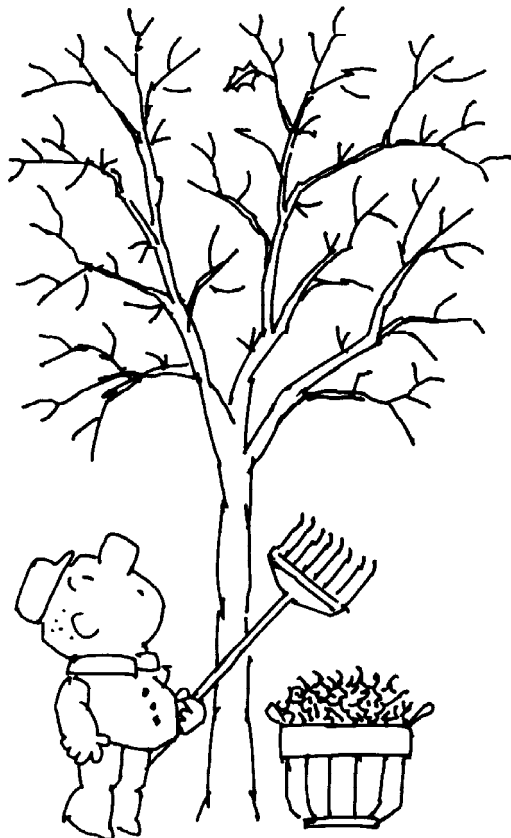

USDF Region 8 Championships

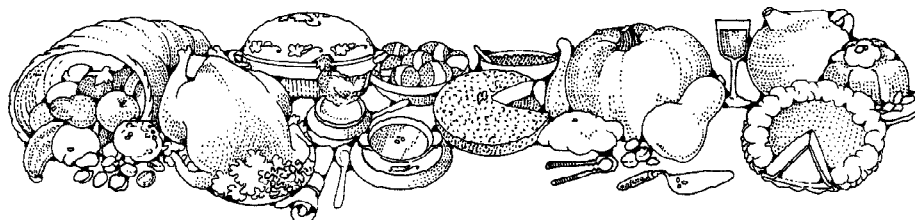
The USDF Region 8 Championships were held October 3, 1998 at the HITS show grounds in Ellenville, NY. The hosting GMO was Westchester-Fairfield Dressage Association. There were more than 155 championships' rides, more than double last year. There were 750 rides scheduled during the 2 days in 7 rings. Quite an undertaking!

WFDA generously arranged the Saturday night dinner to be a benefit for Region 8, and for the 100 or so people who attended and had the opportunity to listen to Lendon Gray speak it was a special evening. In my introduction of Lendon, I noted that she had ridden in 10 classes on Saturday, was speaking at the dinner, and then had 11 rides on Sunday. Interesting that her one weekend of riding is equivalent to our entire season, if we normally ride 1 or 2 horses in 3-5 shows in a season. Her stamina, commitment, intensity, and concentration (she rides EVERY test from memory) are evident.

Lendon's speech can best be described as comprehensive, as she touched on all aspects of horsemanship: riders, owners, juniors, show managers, judges, competitors, volunteers, spectators, support staff (spouses, etc.), and horses. A few random excerpts: owners should always be thanked for their generosity in giving mounts so others can learn; judges should reward proper training and riding, not just artificial frames and/or gaits; juniors need our support as they are the future of dressage; and our horses, especially our schoolmasters, are our most valuable commodities. She ended the evening reading a note written by someone telling Lendon of the death of an old horse that had, as a wild youngster, belonged to Lendon. This person had acquired this horse as a schoolmaster, and it, in its inimitable kindness, had at one time volunteered "5 perfect two tempis that would never be forgotten for their wonderful feeling."

On behalf of Region 8, I'd like to thank all of you who worked during the season to compete and qualify for the Regional Championships. The program has certainly proved a success in 1998, and this will hopefully be repeated in 1999. To the winners of 1998: congratulations!
